Saint of the Month: St Marina of Antioch beheaded 17th July 304 AD

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Marina lived in what is now modern-day Pisidia, Turkey, in the early fourth century. Her father was a pagan priest, and her mother died in childbirth. The unwanted Marina was then left in the care of a nursemaid, who was later discharged of her duties and sent to work as a shepherdess. While still a teenager, Marina made a vow of perpetual chastity to God.

One day, while Marina was tending sheep, a Roman prefect attempted to seduce her. When she refused his advances, she was denounced as a Christian. Upon refusing to sacrifice to the pagan gods, she was subjected to various tortures, including being beaten with clubs and her skin being raked with iron combs. One rather interesting torment included plunging Marina into a cauldron of boiling water, out of which she came unharmed, singing God's praises.

Again imprisoned, the devil tried to frighten her three times. Once as a dragon he attempted to devour her, holding half of her body in his mouth. Praying, she made the sign of the cross and the beast was torn apart and vanished.

Again, he appeared as a man, black as night. She seized his hair and beat him with a hammer until he left her sight. Again, he grabbed her and threatened to kill her if she would not stop praying. She whipped him, and finally a light appeared from Heaven in the form of a cross. A white dove told her to rejoice for she had vanquished the enemy, and she was completely healed. She was eventually beheaded at the age of sixteen, around the year AD 304.

Until the sacking of Constantinople by Western crusaders in the year 1204, the relics of the Great Martyr Marina were in the Panteponteia monastery. According to other sources, they were located in Antioch until the year 908 and from there transferred to Italy. Now they are in Athens, in a church dedicated to the holy Virgin Martyr. Her venerable hand was transferred to Mount Athos, to Vatopedi Monastery.


How does this affect me?

Cast your net into the deep and many little and great fish will be caught into the net of the kingdom, a net not torn.

So, making disciples is also how we become Orthodox, including those of us who are Orthodox Christian already. Good fishing!



Book of the Month

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Book Review: Thinking Orthodox: Understanding and Acquiring the Orthodox Mind by Eugenia Scarvelis Constantinou

In the foreword, Archpriest John McGuckin writes: "[Seek] that 'inner mind that grows on one, and in one, as a person accommodates him or herself to the growing culture of Orthodoxy

which being in the Church nurtures and fosters within a person." This is what St. Paul called 'that mindset which was in Christ Jesus,' the phronema [pronounced FROH-nee-mah] Christou (Phil 2.5). How this grows in us, and what it entails for those who wish to develop it, is the key subject of this book [p. xii].

Dr. and Presbytera Eugenia writes: "The Orthodox phronema allows us to accept who we are (our limitations) and who God is (the Unlimited) so that we may simply exist in the presence of God, worshipping the All-Holy Trinity.... [p. 16]....The Incarnation was the union of the human and divine in Christ. Through this union within His person, Jesus sanctified human nature and made it possible for us once again to be united with God... The cross is never separated from the Resurrection" [p. 55].

"All of us will fail. All of us will fall. Repeatedly. The greatest threat to our salvation is not falling but a lack of humility... We must continually check and revaluate ourselves.... Do not forget [you] are called to 'be transformed by the renewal of your mind.'" [Rom 12.2] [pp. 102-103].

Becoming Orthodox Christian

All of us, including the baptised are BECOMING Orthodox. This is a process that never ends. Even after death, St Gregory of Nyssa taught that our ascent to God will be unending. However, we do need to make a start and that is what conversion and repentance are all about. Without this, "becoming Orthodox" would be just a question of increasing the numbers in church; church growth as a mere exercise in arithmetic. This is why at St Aidan's we take preparation for baptism very seriously indeed. The ascended Christ commissioned the Apostles to "... make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you ..." (Matthew 28:19-20) So, becoming Orthodox is about becoming an obedient disciple of Jesus Christ, whereby through conversion and repentance new birth may be found within the Church which is Christ's own very Body (1 Corinthians 12:12-31)

In order, therefore, that we as a community might be effective in making disciples, followers who stick to the way of the cross, some teaching, preparation and discernment needs to take place before baptism. For young people and adults this involves attending cate-chumenate sessions, usually by Zoom as this best suits people today. For infants we expect those parents without a history in our community to attend in person three sessions at the end of the Liturgy.

How do we reach out to find new disciples? Some just come and see as a result of their own spiritual journeys and explorations. Others may need encouragement to ask the deeper questions of life. Why am I here? Where am I headed?
