Fasting Recipe for the Holy Cross Fast

CHOCOLATE OIL CAKE

Prep Time: 10 mins Cook Time: 40 mins Total Time: 50 mins

INGREDIENTS

2 cups white sugar
3 cups plain flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
½ cup unsweetened cocoa powder
2 cups water
1 cup vegetable oil
1 teaspoon vanilla extract



Preheat oven to 350°F (175°C). Line a 9x13 inch tin with baking parchment. Mix sugar, flour, baking powder, salt and cocoa together in a large bowl. Add water, oil and vanilla and whisk by hand until smooth. Pour into the prepared tin and bake until a toothpick inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean – approximately 40 minutes.






The Russian Orthodox Pilgrimage to St Winifred's Holywell is unfortunately on the same day as our Summer Gala but you can go to the same pilgrimage organised by the Greek Archdiocese on 7th October. by Father Andrew Stephen Damick (Ancient Faith Publishing, 2014)

Father Andrew begins this helpful book with the words: "Jesus Christ is the Messiah. He rose from the dead. Humanity can therefore be saved. Those three sentences constitute the core narrative of the Gospel, the good news according to the Orthodox Christian faith" (p. 19). He concludes the introduction with the firm statement: "Jesus [Christ] founded only one Church to be His Body, not the multitude of Christian denominations we see in our own day. Only one Church has maintained that continuous existence through all the centuries since the Resurrection of Christ, teaching and believing and living the same Christian life throughout history. That Church is the Orthodox Church.... The rest of the book proceeds from this essential Gospel story" (p. 24).

Journey to Orthodoxy: Edward Bennigsen



Whenever I get asked "What led you to Orthodoxy?" I find it difficult to answer. It feels a bit like when you're dating, and a friend asks "So, why do you like them?" Reducing it to a series of logical statements is far too dry, but if you focus on how they make you feel then your friend's eyes quickly glaze over. In both questions, I've ended up simply trying to tell my story.

I have lived in Manchester nearly all my life. I was raised by loving, devout Evangelical Christian parents, along with my four siblings. We attended various Protestant churches of the Charismatic flavour. These expressions of faith always appealed to my emotive nature. In my adulthood, I gravitated towards more Reformed churches and teaching, in an attempt to find a solid intellectual grounding for my faith. Everything seemed to be going well, until March 2020.

In three days, I received three terrible wounds. A major spiritual mentor was fired from my church due to a scandal; my girlfriend broke up with me; the PM began to enact the Covid lockdown. I moved back in with my parents and lived in a deep depression for several months. It felt like my world had ended.

The word "apocalypse" is generally taken to mean the end of the world. But the Greek root refers to "revelation" or prophecy: God's truth breaking through the humdrum of life, the veil pulled back, and a glimpse of a deeper reality. My own personal apocalypse started out at the end of the world, but became an opportunity to see the revelation of God.

My apocalypse had been building for a while. I was becoming increasingly frustrated with my spirituality, which seemed mainly focused on church rotas. Since my childhood I'd been very good at playing the "nice Christian boy", despite hiding some less-than-nice sins from others. I was feeling increasingly disembodied, with my job in IT being "in the cloud", disconnected from the natural world.

I stumbled my way into Orthodox teaching online, primed by a few passing references in Protestant books, and my elder brothers' interest in "apostolic Christianity" (one is now Orthodox, the other is Roman Catholic!). Over and over again, I heard the same advice: "Get to the services! Orthodoxy is about worship, not just ideas."

Eventually, I plucked up enough courage to pop into St Aidan's. Sat at the back, one of my first experiences was to hear the choir chant this verse:

"We have seen the True Light; we have received the Heavenly Spirit; we have found the True Faith, worshiping the Undivided Trinity, Who has saved us."

I was moved to tears. Was it really possible that there was a True Faith? I wept many more times as I investigated that question and found the hymn to be true. During the Nativity Fast last year, I was received by chrismation into the Church. It was so wonderful to sing that hymn after being anointed with Holy Chrism and receiving the Eucharist. Truly, I have found the True Faith, and truly, the Undivided Trinity has saved me. Amen.

What has reggae to do with evangelism, you ask, let alone with spreading the Orthodox Christian Faith or the Gospel of our Lord and God and Saviour Jesus Christ for that matter? Take for instance the true to life song Many Rivers to Cross by renown reggae artist Jimmy Cliff. This song was the result of his going through one of the lowest points in his life as he struggled his way through performing small gigs in pubs and clubs in England waiting for a break that seemed like it would never come. Topics covered by artists such as Jimmy Cliff, Bob Marley, and others stay with the themes of freedom, suffering, anti-slavery, religion, love and unity. Marley's last song was a reflection on his mortality as he stared death in the face and in which he boldly declared, "My hands
